

## Maui's quieter side Makena

"This is Maui the way it used to be — dirt roads; undeveloped, rugged terrain; and, most importantly — quiet," said the purposeful tourist, a former college football star turned insurance executive, as he strode down deserted Maluaka Beach on the island's south shore with his 3-year-old daughter in tow. "It's no accident we chose Makena for our family vacation."

Indeed, Makena is becoming a popular location for those who want to avoid the sometimes-chaotic tourist scene that often defines Maui. But, as the aforementioned tourist, Steve DiPietro, president and CEO of ClearPoint Insurance in Seattle and a native of Oakland, Calif., points out, "not too popular."

There is, after all, only one hotel in Makena, a former fishing village that once served as one of the main harbors of Maui, but which now finds itself mostly isolated from the rest of the island, which is just the way DiPietro, and others who come to the area, like it.

"We used to stay up on the west shore, but sometimes it feels like you need a vacation from your vacation up there," said the former Cal Poly at San Luis Obispo quarterback, who still carries a chiseled frame nearly 20 years after his playing career ended — when a seldom-used special teams player, Danny Lilly, a

loan officer from Concord, Calif., landed wrong on his left knee during practice.

"Hey, it was an accident; enough about that already," chipped in the eavesdropping Lilly from a lounge chair across the pool at the Maui Price Hotel.

After the injury incident, Lilly had visited DiPietro in the hospital, to say how sorry he was, and the two have been close ever since, sharing family vacations to Maui every year.

"We've been bringing our families here for as long as I can remember," said Lilly, but it's only been the in the past few years that we 'discovered' Makena.

"I'm a little torn right now between saying how wonderful it is here, and just keeping my mouth shut, because a big part of me doesn't want the word to get out," explained Lilly. "It feels like our own private slice of paradise."

Due to its geographic isolation, visitors to Makena often spend their entire vacation right there, since venturing out to other parts of the island requires longer hours riding in a car than most would prefer.

"Sure, you miss out on some things by staying here, but you gain so much more," said Lilly's wife, Tina, a homemaker and native of Hong Kong. "The history here is rich, and you feel a sense of it as you travel down the dirt roads past remnants of the old, abandoned fishing villages.

"It's also a place where you have time for yourself, and the ones you love," added Tina. "There is nothing on the agenda here but relaxation."

And though there is more than enough time for ample relaxation in Makena, the area also offers oppor-

tunities for those who crave a little more physical activity.

"The area is so varied, from hiking past ancient lava fields to playing on its world class golf course, or scuba diving and snorkeling in the ocean. Makena is the perfect blend of solitude and recreation," said DiPietro's wife, Marie Passion, an advertising executive and native of Chicago. "It's the type of place you go with the people you love, because it is too beautiful not to be shared with those closest to you."

That feeling of "love" may have been why Makena was a favorite stop on the island-hopping hippie trail during the 1960s and '70s, when one of Makena's beaches became a nudist sanctuary with an almost commune-like atmosphere.

"You still hear the legendary stories about Big Beach [Oneloa] and Little Beach [Puu Olai]," said Passion, "and about all the famous rock stars and hippies who used to hang out there in the buff. Everyone had their swimsuits on when we visited, though, thank goodness."

"The other week I was at a sports bar and the bartender asked me 'what'll it be pops,'" lamented Lilly. "He said it in a nice way, so it wasn't offensive or anything. But, for the first time, I really came to grips with the fact that I'm not a young man anymore."

"I think as the years go by, I'm more appreciative of the beauty the world has to offer, and as far as I'm concerned, Makena is the most beautiful place on earth."

# Devotion to the Corps becomes a family tradition

When Renin Warner, a retired master sergeant, joined the Marine Corps in 1963, he had no idea that he was beginning a family tradition.

Gunnery Sgt. Angela Maness, administration chief for Marine Aviation Logistics Squadron 24 and the daughter of Warner, always looked up to her dad and wanted to be a Marine.

"My dad was an awesome person," said Maness. "I remember when I was a child always admiring how dedicated he was to his family and the Corps. I will never forget how he looked out after his troops. They could call our house at any hour, and my dad would go help them, regardless of the situation."

Maness remembers when she began to understand the concept of being a Marine at age 10. Like most families in the military, theirs moved almost every three years. She realized the amount of dedication it took to be a good Marine. She then decided she wanted to follow in her dad's footsteps.

In June 1987, Maness took the first step to become a Marine. At the age of 24, she graduated from Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island, S.C.

"My dad came to my graduation at PI, and during the pinning ceremony of the eagle, globe and anchor — which is usually performed by the senior drill instructor — my father was there to pin me,"

said Maness. "It was a very emotional experience, and I will never forget it."

Within a year, Andrea Killalea, Maness' sister, who is now a gunnery sergeant and a polygraph test examiner for the military police station aboard Pearl Harbor, found herself in the recruiting station with Maness, then a lance corporal.

"I needed some promotion points to pick up corporal," said Maness. "I took her down to the recruiter in Quantico,

Va. She was 19 and needed some discipline and direction in her life."

Again, Warner found himself pinning another one of his daughters with the cherished eagle, globe and anchor at a PI graduation.

The tradition did not stop there. Lance Cpl. Tommy Maness, a TOW gunner for 2nd Bn., 25th Marine Regiment, was assigned to fight the war in Iraq.

He wanted to carry on the tradition of serving proudly in the Marine Corps.

"I wanted to follow in the footsteps of my family," said Tommy Maness to a lo-

cal newspaper in Tulsa, Okla. "It has been something I have looked forward to since I can remember."

Tommy Maness called his mother before being sent to Iraq. At first she was proud of her son for all of his accomplishments and for being brave.

"I told my son he was going where every Marine wants to go right now. I told him to keep his head down and his spirits high," said his mother, Angela Maness. "After I got off the phone with him, I realized I was talking to him as a Marine, and my maternal instincts kicked in."

# Ham remains an Easter meal favorite

A traditional Easter feast isn't complete without a succulent ham, so try these quick and easy recipe ideas:



### Tangy Dijon Glazed Ham

- 1 bone-in spiral sliced ham
- 1/4 cup apricot jam
- 1/4 cup raspberry jam
- 1/2 cup dijon mustard
- Dash of whole grain mustard
- 1/4 cup fresh chives, finely sliced
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1/4 cup horseradish
- 1/4 cup dried cherries, roughly chopped
- 1/4 teaspoon salt, to taste

1/2 teaspoon fresh ground pepper, to taste

Prepare and heat ham according to package directions. To prepare glaze, combine all remaining ingredients in bowl, then mix well and set aside.

Brush glaze on your ham 30 minutes before meat is done.

Heat ham uncovered for final 30 minutes, then carve and serve. Yield varies, depending on size of ham.

### Pineapple Honey-Glazed Ham

- 1 (4 to 5 pound.) fully cooked boneless ham
- 1/3 cup honey
- 1 8 oz. can pineapple slices
- 1 tablespoon ground mustard
- Dash of ground cloves

Bake ham on rack in shallow baking pan at 325 degrees for one hour, or to 120 degrees with a meat thermometer. Drain pineapple; reserve juice.

Combine reserved juice, honey, mustard and cloves; mix well. Score top of ham, if desired, and arrange pineapple slices on top.

Generously brush honey mixture over entire surface. Bake about 30 - 45 minutes longer, or to 140 degrees; baste every 10 minutes.

Let stand 10 - 15 minutes before slicing. Recipe yields 12 to 16 servings.



# Sacred grounds undisturbed by military training

**BELLOWS** — The land now comprising Bellows Air Force Station and Marine Corps Training Area Bellows has been used for military training purposes since Hawaii was a U.S. territory.

In 1917, a Presidential Executive Order established Waimanalo Military Reservation on land leased from the Waimanalo Sugar Plantation. However, prior to the use of this land for military purposes, the area was cultivated for sugar and ranching activities, and the area supported local farms of taro fields.

Passersby can see the historic cemetery located within the MCTAB train-

ing area. It is characterized as having been active in the first half of the 20th century.

The earliest date on an existing grave marker is 1911, and most of the dated graves fall between 1911 and 1919. The latest dated grave marker is 1943.

People associated with the former sugar plantation were normally laid to rest in the cemetery. The dominant ethnic group was Japanese, but people of other ethnic backgrounds, including Filipino and possibly Hawaiian, may also be buried in unmarked graves.

It is estimated that between 100 and 150 individuals are buried here.

Training activities are prohibited within the

cemetery site. However, the fact that the cemetery is located within the military training area, makes it part of the tactical rules of engagement.

As a culturally sensitive site, no firing or maneuver may impact its location.

Efforts to preserve the historic archeological site are conducted on a routine basis by the Marines and Sailors of MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay's Self Help Shop, part of the base Facilities department.

Once a quarter, and prior to Obon, the Marines and Sailors use brush hogs, weed eaters and rakes to clear out the sometimes waist-high grass. They take much care not to disturb the sacred grounds while they are clearing the grass.

### **Deployment Resources**

Several resources are provided to support family members during a Marine's deployment such as Web links and telephone assistance.

While no caller is turned away, the volume of calls from friends and relatives may degrade the ability of the immediate family in receiving referral and support services. Therefore, it is preferred that only the immediate family — the spouse, if married, parents or siblings —

call telephone numbers that are answered by Marine Corps support personnel. Relatives or friends should only call numbers that provide updated, recorded information.

The Key Volunteer Network also provides information support for spouses of married Marines. This volunteer network, comprised of spouses of Marines in the unit, passes timely and accurate unit information, when received from the command, to Marine spouses. The network is set up prior to unit deployments.


