

Lookout offers glimpse of Oahu's past

NU'UANU VALLEY - The Koolau Range, like a dress of stone, falls in folds and wrinkles for miles, acting as the barrier between the Honolulu valley area and the Windward side of Oahu. Once a volcano, its steep palis (cliffs) and dark vales now evoke an enigmatic aura, shrouded in mystery and legend. The Pali Lookout stands out as its monument, a testament to a dark past both bloody and grim.

The Pali Lookout's story intertwines with Hawaii's own - the story of creation - islands born from the Pacific depths some 40 million years ago. The Hawaiian archipelago, shaped by the capricious forces of fire, magma, rain, wind and man, is filled with spots of grandeur, including the Pali Lookout, whose fame stems from its connection with the great Hawaiian king, Kamehameha.

Kamehameha, like other legendary leaders, was surrounded by myth. Where historical facts stop, tall tales begin. According to Hawaiian lore, it was prophesized that a new king would be born, one that would lead a rebellion and spill much blood throughout the is-

lands. As Kamehameha's birth approached, Alapainui, the ruler of the Big Island, made plans to have the child killed at birth.

As Hawaiian myth tells, the king was born on a stormy night, when a star bearing a long tail of white flame flashed across the sky. Many Hawaiian folklorists believe it was in the year 1758, which was a year Halley's comet was visible. Like King Herod's search for the Christ child, Alapainui's men hunted for the infant in vain. However, he was hidden in a basket and covered with leaves, like Moses, and would someday grow up to make his mark on history.

Little more than 30 years later, Kamehameha invaded Maui in commencing his tirade across the Hawaiian archipelago, in an effort to unify the chain under his rule.

By 1795, the young king had arrived on the beaches of Oahu with some 12,000 men, and was engaged in vicious conflict with the armies of Kalanikupule, the reigning chief of Oahu. The defending forces were driven across the valley where Honolulu know stands, and up the Nu'uuanu Valley until they could go no further. As they looked back, they had come to the top of the Pali - and saw the valley - hundreds of feet below. They fought all

the fiercer, but to no avail. The warriors of Kamehameha overcame the defenders and pushed them off the ledge to plummet to their deaths below.

Kamehameha, with the help of this stunning victory, eventually united all of the islands, by both force and diplomacy. His tactics have led many to call him the "Napoleon of the Pacific."


In 1897, an American engineering firm was given the task of building a road on the steep slopes of the Koolau Range. The artery was to go through the Pali Lookout, where the fateful battle had occurred some 100 years before. As workers excavated, bones upon bones were found. Dynamite blasted the ground, throwing dirt and stone over the remains. The memories of the Pali were not buried with them, however.

To this day, even though a new highway has been built, many

tourists and natives alike come to the windswept Lookout for both its spectacular panorama, and its chilling past. The view offers a look at a large section of the windward side of the island, including MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay. Around Halloween, visitors come for other purposes. With its dark legends, many feel the location is haunted. Guided tours are available for those seeking the thrill of the supernatural, as well as an in-depth account of the battle.
