



# Military Academic Skills Program helps K-Bay

Education is the key to opportunity.

In today's world, getting a good paying job or furthering a career can often be helped or hindered by the amount of school a person has had.

In the military, test scores can determine a service member's Military Occupational Speciality.

Like many people in the civilian world, military members are always looking for ways to further their careers, but if they don't have the test scores to move on, their progress could be stopped.

To help service members in such predicaments, the Military Academic Skills Program, which is offered aboard MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay and around the Marine Corps, is designed to help students reach their desired goals by helping to improve test scores.

"This is a very exciting course that is basically designed to help students score better on tests," said Loretta Cornett-Huff, program manager at the Joint Education

Center here.

"We provide a very stable learning environment where the student does not have anything else to worry about except for the course," she continued.

"The results we hear about are always very good, and I'd like to encourage anyone who wants to improve to sign up and start changing their perspective on learning."

The four week course requires that the enrolled service member be relieved of all other duties throughout the class, so as to provide an appropriate learning environment for the individual.

Once completed, Marines usually show vast improvement in their test scores compared with those taken prior to the course.

Sergeant Kenneth Kuss, a comptroller from Combat Service Support Group 3, is one success story.

When looking toward improving his future by applying for the Marine Enlisted Commissioning Program, Kuss realized he did not quite have the scores needed to become an officer.

After a quick chat with his

unit education officer, Kuss found himself as part of a MASP class.

"We worked on a lot of the basic English and math skills that would be found on a test like the ASVAB," said Kuss. "We took a mock-test every Friday and my scores steadily increased throughout the class."

"It's not really like learning anything new. It's more like taking all the things you learned before in high school and other places and refreshing it all so you can call on it again."

After completing the course, Kuss had raised his scores high enough to qualify for the MECF, and is currently awaiting the results of his submission to the program.

Last year, more than 75 service members and dependents graduated from the course. The majority all of them showed some kind of improvement in their test scores.

## Teens discuss issues with Marine Corps leaders

Twelve teenagers from MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, Teen Activity Center's Keystone Club took part in the Marine Corps-wide 2002 Virtual Teen Summit, via a video teleconference at the Joint Education Center July 26.

Special guests Sgt. Major William T. Wilson, from Headquarters Marine Forces Pacific were also in attendance to watch the summit.

Teenagers and guests watched a live 90-minute broadcast that featured the Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps, Sgt. Maj. Alford L. McMichael and Mrs. McMichael who responded to questions from teens across the Marine Corps.

The summit allowed the Marine Corps teens to communicate and explore issues that affect today's military, develop solutions and make recommendations.

"In prior years, the teen summit was held in Washington D.C. where one teen and one adult from each Marine Corps base attended," said Dave Kawada, Youth Activities director for K-Bay. "This year they changed the format to a virtual town meeting. Unlike the old format, this virtual summit allowed us to gather all our teens together creating a business and social event where they had the ability to work together with key decision makers of the Corps."

The Club met regularly to formulate the top three issues they wanted to discuss with the Marine Corps leaders and other teen cen-

ters. "The club was overseen by Sophia Hoskins, the team program coordinator, she was in charge of it all," said Kawada. "But the topics were completely chosen, drafted and voted upon by the kids."

The teens had the option of submitting their concerns and solutions in advance by either phone, fax or email.

Keystone Club president, Heather Eldrid, 15, was the show's first caller. She suggested to Sgt. Major McMichael, that Youth Activities should create a fund for a junior leader employment program for ages 13-17, with an average pay rate of \$5 per hour.

Mark Drinkwater, 16, was also able to make a call. He requested more diversity of music at the teen centers. Kaneohe Bay was the only installation to have two questions aired on the broadcast.

Other issues discussed included the teen center programming, space and equipment, skate parks and guest policies regarding civilians brought onto the installations and getting teen's more involved in base programs.

Not all topics could be addressed in the show, but McMichael plans to review the faxes and emails not answered and take them into account.

"It's important to continue having something for the teens every year, be it a conference or virtual summit," said Kawada. "Their voices get heard and get a response and action. How many teenagers have a chance to bounce their ideas off of top military leaders not many."
