

Fire extinguishing Marines educate keiki about their job

Marines from Aircraft Rescue and Fire Fighting at Marine Corps Air Facility, MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, took a break from their busy schedule to perform a fire-fighting emergency demonstration to a group of teachers and children from a local preschool, July 25.

During their visit, 11 students and two teachers from Aikahi Preschool, located right outside the back gate, learned about the wide variety of vehicles and tools Marines use to fight flames on the flight line.

"We thought the kids would like to learn more about emergency vehicles and see what some of their fathers did for work on the base," said Colleen Sangster, teacher at the pre school.

When the group arrived at the ARFF facility, the kids received a warm welcome from Sparky, the fire prevention dog, who amused and entertained the kids with his fire prevention dog antics.

"I liked Sparky the Dog, and watching the men spray the cones down," said 4-

year-old Freedom Morland, student at the pre school.

"I think the most significant lesson the kids learned today was seeing how important these men and women are during an emergency situation," said Sangster.

In addition to watching the Marines react to an emergency, the kids got to see the way these fire extinguishing warriors attack their objective.

"I think it's wonderful that the Marines took time out of their schedule to perform this demonstration," explained Sangster. "The kids really enjoyed watching everything they did. Also, watching the Marines gives them a sense of what they may want to do when they grow up."

Besides the ARFF Marines' dedication to defend this country and fight fires, they said they appreciated the opportunity to teach the local community about their dangerous job.

"We know that we're role models to some of these kids in the community," said Sgt. Richard Ransom, assistant section leader at ARFF. "Besides, it's a pleasure to inform the community about what we do here."


of Kaneohe Bay will have military unit booths and static displays of weapons of defense. Matches of might and muscle will also be showcased.
