



'Aloha again
from Hawaii'

Elvis Wade to salute military at Waikiki Shell, Aug. 16

Elvis looks like him, he sounds like him, he moves like him. So, if you thought you spotted the legendary "King of Rock and Roll" on Naval Station Pearl Harbor, or around Oahu recently, your mind wasn't playing tricks on you.

Yes, Elvis was here.

Elvis Wade, the world-renowned Elvis tribute artist who bears an uncanny resemblance to the legendary performer is spending some time in the islands and visited with Sailors aboard the USS Crommelin (FFG 37).

When he joined the Sailors aboard the guided-missile frigate, they took the opportunity to shake his hand, "talked story" and learned a little about the man who has spent the last 35 years performing a la Elvis.

At a stop in the ship's wardroom, Elvis Wade entertained those who gathered with stories about some of his experiences. He also expressed his thanks for the service members of all the armed forces.

Emphasizing that "people need to go to other countries to see how much America is blessed," he added, "Our armed forces keep us that way; you keep us safe and free."

"Elvis Wade represents a lot of values and a humanity for his fellow human beings," said Ensign Jason Bateman, the ship's public affairs officer. "You could see that he was caring and related to people."

As he toured the frigate, the entertainer chatted casually with Sailors.

"He was pretty cool, and I was glad I got to meet him," said Petty Officer 1st Class Christopher Stone, who has long been an Elvis fan.

Wade talked about the icon after whom he has modeled his performances.

"Elvis was a down-home country boy from Tennessee and easy going, very polite. He loved people and he was very giving. Elvis was very proud to be an American."

Wade, too, wears his patriotism proudly and expressed his gratitude to the armed forces.

"I pray for the guys every day. I am really proud of the men and women who serve our country" he said in his Tennessee drawl. "This is my opportunity to say thank you and let them know how much I appreciate their willingness to fight for our country and to protect me and my family."

The performer explained that his wife, Sandy Posey, a recording artist, just wrote "Another Brave Soldier Died Today." She was a backup singer for Elvis Presley and currently tours as a backup singer in his shows.

Wade also stopped at Pearl Harbor's Bloch Arena and stood in the same place where Elvis Presley performed his fundraising concert to help raise money to build the Arizona Memorial. He spoke of how he feels when performing in many of the same venues where Presley performed.

"It's very nostalgic. It's sort of the same feeling as when I visited Graceland," he reflected.

The seasoned singer doesn't do Vegas-type nightclub shows. He explained that he works in larger venues, such as arenas, and has presented the Elvis Wade Show throughout the U.S. and all around the world. For years, he also shared the stage with the Jordanaires, the backup group for Elvis Presley.

The performer has a lot of stories and experiences to share. But probably, the most notable one tells about the show he performed when Elvis Presley was in the audience.

"Elvis came to my show and gave me a standing ovation," he reminisced. "He was fascinated by what I did. He loved the show."

When Elvis Wade is paying tribute to The King by singing his songs, his most important objective is to keep the original arrangements intact.


"I want to keep it as close to the original arrangement — musically and vocally — as possible. That's the way people



After months away from school and homework, it's time for parents to help their children prepare for class.

A successful school year, according to Dr. Andrea Pastorok, an educational specialist with Kumon Math & Reading Centers, can depend on how smooth a child transitions from vacation.

Dr. Pastorok suggests the following tips for a successful route back-to-school.

Tips for Success

- Focus on the Positives.** Talk to your children about their summer accomplishments and recognize the skills they used to be successful such as perseverance, time-management, responsibility and independence, which are the same skills that will help them succeed in school.

- Give your child genuine and frequent praise.** Praise your child's progress, not perfection. Let children know that you believe in them, you think they are spe-

cial and you have confidence in them.

Let them know that you recognize and value their efforts, not just their final accomplishments.

- Set up a study area for your child.** It should be quiet (no TV or stereo), well-ventilated, free of distractions (no phones, pets), well-lit and equipped with all necessary supplies for the child (pens, paper, markers, dictionary, thesaurus and other items needed.).

- Establish a consistent homework routine at the very beginning.** Schedule daily homework time in your house, so it becomes a part of your family's routine. This also helps children to see that homework is a priority in your home.

- Make time to get acquainted with your child's teachers and keep the communication open.** Discuss goal-setting with both your child and the teacher. This parent-teacher-child partnership will be very effective in the development of healthy homework habits that will in turn help children have a successful school year.

1/12 constructs a fence for Aikahi Elementary

KAILUA — Devil dogs from 1st Bn., 12th Marines, volunteered their time and energy throughout the past two weeks to clear out brush and install a fence for the children of Aikahi Elementary School here.

Aikahi Elementary School, sponsored by 1/12 through the Adopt-a-School program, came to the unit for assistance when it was having difficulty funding a fence installation project.

"We were having trouble with things on campus turning up missing, as well as some looting," said Molly McCarthy, principal of Aikahi Elementary. "The fence needed to be installed to protect our assets on campus, as well as the children who attend the school."

When Hawaii State Senator Daniel Inouye teamed the school up with the Joint Venture Education Forum, Adopt-a-School program, the

Marines from 1/12 were standing by with the manpower to help the school out.

"We received money for materials and ground cover, but if it weren't for the Marines donating their time, our budget couldn't have afforded the labor costs to complete the project," said McCarthy.

The Marines from 1/12 spent the majority of their first week at the school clearing brush and overgrown vegetation in the corner of the campus, and then began installing the fence the second week.

"The school and the head custo-

A+ snacks add punch to lunch boxes

Lunchtime is one of the most important moments of your children's school day. While compact, portable coolers have replaced the Annie Oakley and Wild Bill Hickock lunch boxes of the 1950s, the contents have not evolved much, with peanut butter and jelly and tuna fish sandwiches making regular appearances.

This year, school lunch doesn't have to be boring. You can revitalize your kids' packed lunches by filling their lunch boxes, brown bags or space-age coolers with healthy and delicious twists on old lunchtime favorites such as tuna salad "sushi."

Revitalize school lunches with twists on classic favorites like tuna salad "sushi."

Tuna Salad "Sushi"

(Prep time: 10 minutes
Makes 2 servings)

1 can (12 ounces) chunk light tuna in water, drained

1/4 cup light mayonnaise

1/2 cup chopped celery
2 large (10-inch) flour tortillas

6 carrot strips

In mixing bowl, stir together tuna, mayonnaise and celery, breaking up any large chunks of tuna.

Place half of the tuna salad on each tortilla in a line slightly below the center of the tortilla.

Make a line of carrot strips along the middle of the tuna salad.

Roll into a cylinder, sushi-fashion; trim ends and cut each roll across into six pieces.

Place in a plastic container, cut sides up.

Here are other lunch packing tips:

- Make a tasty "ice pack" by freezing a juice box.

Toss the box in the lunch bag in the morning and by lunchtime, the food is still cool and the juice is ready to drink.

- Plan for leftovers! If burritos are on the dinner menu, make an extra one and package for a quick, easy lunch.

- Be equipped with sandwich bags. These are a must-have for any lunch sack.

The Marine Corps has produced some of the best leaders in the world who have gone on to make outstanding contributions to society, even after leaving the active ranks.

Several students in the 12th Marine Corps Recruiting District area — most of the Western Coast of the U.S., including Hawaii — came to MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, for the 12th Marine Corps District Leadership School, July 27 through Aug. 2.

charge and be leaders," said retired 1st Sgt. Pete Thornton, a Marine instructor at the school. "The leadership skills they are learning are valuable, regardless as to whether or not they are going to serve in the active ranks of our military or work in civilian jobs."

The eight-day course allowed the students to interact with other JROTC students from the West Coast. The eager cadets learned and demonstrated the desire to do their best in everything — with pride in self, patriotism, personal honor, respect for authority and self discipline. Many plan on enlisting in the Armed Forces and were quite curious about life in the military.

Upon arriving at K-Bay, the JROTC students received a firsthand look at life in the military and sat down and talked to noncommissioned officers. At times, Wade spends as many as 300 days a year on the road performing. The Elvis Wade Show travels with a full band, seven backup singers, a full horn section and a full rhythm section.

Also an ordained Assembly of God minister, the same church denomination to which Elvis Presley belonged, Wade said that when he isn't in concert, he connects with evangelism — mostly a prison ministry, reaching out to those who are incarcerated.

2003 marks Wade's first visit to Hawaii, but the thirtieth anniversary of Elvis Presley's memorable "Aloha from Hawaii" concert at the Waikiki Shell. Wade will also step onstage at the Shell with "Aloha Again from Hawaii" on Aug. 16.

The concert will be dedicated to the military, the many service men and women who put their lives on the line to protect America and preserve her freedoms, and Wade will donate 10 percent of the profits from the concert to the USO.


