

HONOLULU ZOO

HONOLULU — Deep in the heart of Waikiki lies a land filled with the sounds of the tropical rain forest, the dry heat of the Sahara Desert and the rugged terrain of the Australian outback.

All of these experiences and more can be found encased in the small plot of Hawaiian soil known as the Honolulu Zoo, which lies at the end of the "strip" on Kalakaua Ave., directly across from a portion of Waikiki Beach.

From antelope to zebra, zoo-goers can experience the wide array of flora and fauna the Honolulu Zoo has to offer.

For a fee of \$6 with military ID and Kama'aina Card, servicemembers may trek along a road that guides them on a safari through countless exhibits featuring exotic animals and foliage.

Two of the featured attractions of the Honolulu Zoo are Mari, a 25-year-old Indian elephant donated to the children of Honolulu by former Prime Minister of India, Indira Ghandi, and Vaigai, Mari's younger pen mate. Visitors can pet and even feed the gentle giants after a short presentation by the zoo's elephant handlers.

Shortly after leaving the elephants' territory, zoo-goers will encounter the Maynara Bird Sanctuary — a large cage-type structure that houses countless colorful birds. The "open air" enclosure allows visitors to walk in and experience the winged wonders at "up close and personal" range.

To partake in these and many other experiences, visit the Honolulu Zoo any day of the week from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

According to Kolton, the


MCCS website is targeted to become more interactive in the near future.

Single Marines, Sailors hold their largest Shank & Slice Tourney ever

"Go out there and hit them long and straight," were the words of advice from Col. John A. LeMoine, deputy commander, MCB Hawaii, at the Single Marine and Sailor Program's Shank and Slice golf tourney, Friday.

However, with a morning of gusty trades blowing in an overcast sky, spurring light showers, the advice was difficult to put into action for the group of Marines and Sailors that braved the weather.

A total of 145 participants gathered around the double-lined golf carts at the Kaneohe Klipper Golf Course to make it the largest SM&SP quarterly golf tournament yet.

"Our prior largest tournament was held August of last year with 97 participants," said Dawn Williams, SM&SP Manager.

"This tournament was different from all the others in that we invited staff noncommissioned officers in charge to bring three or more of their single friends to play golf with them for the afternoon," added Williams.

The tournament attracted players of all skill levels, from novice to expert. Hence, the format of the tournament was a scramble.

"This type of format is designed to improve timeliness, enhance team play and interaction, and make it enjoyable for different skill levels of players," said Todd Murata, Klipper Pro Manager.

The purpose of the Shank & Slice is to get the single Enlisted Marines and Sailors — especially the junior enlisted — out of the office to enjoy an afternoon in a recreational environment.

The object is to introduce them to a new sport as well as get them out of the office for a morale booster, Williams explained.

3/3 Marines storm Pope Elementary School, make needed repairs to school's library

More than 20 Marine volunteers from 3rd Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment went to Pope Elementary School in Waimanalo and helped rebuild its library July 25 as part of the Adopt-A-School program.

The Marines spent the morning restocking the shelves with books, rebuilding the school's computer room, and providing supplies for future maintenance projects.

"The Marines being here today was a big help, because it was the first day of school, and we didn't have the library set up yet," said Nani Akeo, head custodian for Pope Elementary School.

With only a couple of staff members to unload hundreds of boxes of books and rebuild more than a dozen computer room cabinets, the library looked like it might not be available to the students for some time. But with the motivation and coordination of the 3/3 Marines, the overwhelming project took only a couple of hours to complete.

"If we were to do it ourselves with only our resources it would have taken a month," said Jade Takanishi, the school librarian. "We were concerned on how we were going to get the work done. The Marines have been phenomenally helpful."

The school only has two full time and two part time custodians, and

they had been working all summer to get the school ready for the first day of classes, according to Akeo.

School custodians spent much of their summer striping and waxing floors, repairing furniture, moving and preparing classrooms for new teachers.

The completion of the library does not mean the 3/3 Marine's mission is finished yet. There are more projects scheduled to be completed in the near future, according to Akeo.

One of those projects will help the school get out of trouble with the local city council.


A creek that borders one of the school's fence lines has become overgrown with vegetation and needs to be cleared.

The Marines will begin to clear the area as soon as arrangements for the disposal of the unwanted vegetation are worked out.

There are also plans for a garden to be planted for the school.

For some Marines of 3/3, the opportunity to show the local community that they can help was all the motivation they needed to volunteer for the Adopt-A-School program.

"I'm glad I came here to do this," said Pfc. James F. Davis, a machine-gunner from Kilo Co., 3/3. "We're here to do our jobs in the Corps, but we're also here to show the community that we can contribute back to the them what they have given to us. "Kids are our future, and we should help them any way we can," Davis added.

USO Hawaii Hosts 10K and 5K at Wheeler

This year, the Army's 25th Infantry Division is serving as host to USO Hawaii's annual, major fundraiser, a 10K and a 5K race-walk, Sunday, at Wheeler Army Air Field.

Both races will start at 7 a.m.; the 10K covers 6.2 miles and the 5K covers 3.1 miles. Both are also open to the public and promise to be bigger and better than ever.

The 10K course will include the runway in "The Gulch," a hidden area from which a few U.S. fighter planes were able to get into the air during the Dec. 7, 1941, attack.

The race director will be retired Marine Corps Brig. Gen. Dick Vercauteren, an avid runner.

Brigadier Gen. Vercauteren said the event will be enjoyable for all categories of participants, from hard-core athletes to stroller pushers who may want to amble the 5K at a casual pace. Also, groups of five to 10 runners may form civilian or military teams for the 10K.

Awards will be presented to the top individual and team competitors. As well, all finishers who either walk or run in the 10K or 5K races will be entered into the drawing for thousands of dollars in door prizes.

The grand prize is a trip for two to Disney's California Adventure — complete with air fare, hotel accommodations and park passes.

The entry fee is \$15 for entries mailed by July 31, \$18 afterward. Pick up forms at military base fitness centers, military base exchanges, running stores or the *Hawaii Race* magazine.

All funds raised by the event will directly support the USO of Hawaii, which operates two Hawaii programs in support of U.S. military personnel and their families.

Hawaii Race for the Cure


Applications are being accepted for the Susan G. Komen Hawaii Race for the Cure fundraiser, which will be held Sept. 30 at Kapiolani Park.

Safety Belt Use Policy: The Navy and Marine Corps require all military personnel to wear safety belts at all times, on or off military installations and in any vehicle, government or private. Navy on-duty federal civilians are also required to wear safety belts at all times, as is anyone else who comes on board any Navy or Marine Corps installation or rides in Navy-owned vehicles. Additionally, a child safety seat is required for any child under age (4), weighing less than 40 pounds, who rides in private or government vehicles on base.
