

Renovation at two base clubs nears completion

The MCB Hawaii Officers' and Enlisted Clubs are scheduled to reopen soon, and the improvements to the facilities make both the best the Marine Corps has to offer.

Both clubs are scheduled to be completed by the end of September.

The Enlisted Club is transforming into Kahuna's Sports Bar and Grill, which will be not only one of the best bars on this side of the island, but also a great restaurant where Marines, Sailors and families can enjoy menu items like none other on the base.

"We added big screen televisions, a glowing bar top, a grass-shack ceiling, a new dance floor, and several other improvements," said Bruce Arai, project coordinator for the renovation at both clubs. "The bar is going to feature sports and Hawaiian memorabilia, and we're looking for items to display."


Marines and Sailors can contact the club if they're interested in displaying items in the sports bar.

John Claucherty, deputy assistant chief of staff, G-3, MCB Hawaii. "We have established a new club charter, and given the members the

Facilities employee accepted to Federal leadership program

An electrical engineer with Facilities Department, MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, was selected to participate in the Executive Leadership Program for mid-level employees for fiscal year 03 on July 24.

Dennis Chiu, who is currently working as a facilities planner, was selected ahead of applicants at the Headquarters Marine Corps/Department of the Navy level, and finally at all federal level agencies. Chiu was one of the 60 federal employees selected to participate in the program.

The program is designed for federal personnel who have little or no supervisory experience.

The ELP provides residential training, developmental work experiences, needs assessment and career planning, which gives participants the skills, experience and exposure to move into positions of more responsibility.

"When hearing about the selection, I was surprised and ecstatic," said Chiu. "Larry Hilding, director of the Human Resources

Office aboard K-Bay, was telling me it was a very difficult program to get accepted into because of the amount of highly qualified applicants."

In addition to working as an electrical engineer for facilities, Chiu is also an instructor for computers and technology at Kapiolani Community College, and has his own business setting up local area networks for small businesses.

He has also worked as a computer specialist for K-Bay facilities, and as a nuclear engineer at the Pearl Harbor Naval Shipyard. Additionally, the Honolulu native graduated with high honors from McKinley High School and received his Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering from the University of

Hawaii at Manoa.

Although he has many diverse accomplishments under his belt, the 5-foot, 7-inch engineer believes his biggest personal achievement was co-piloting a single-engine Cessna airplane from California to New Jersey.

Even though he is already a highly qualified candidate for Federal managerial positions, he believes this program could give him that extra edge over his peers.

"I thought this would be a great opportunity to receive some leadership training to help me get into management," said Chiu. "I want to move up in-

to management level positions, and ELP is one way of achieving that because it provides leadership and management classes."

The 44-year-old engineer gives a lot of credit to Carol Boyd, Civilian Leadership Development administrator for K-Bay, for his acceptance.

Chiu said she continuously educated him about the program, and Steve Tome, facilities planning supervisor, supported and encouraged him.

He added that Hilding helped by pushing him over the edge to apply, and explained how the program will enhance his career.

"Without the support of these people, I don't think I would have applied," said Chiu.

All in all, his acceptance to the program is a winning situation for both the engineer and the base.

"If there is an opportunity for a position in management, the base will already have a trained and knowledgeable manager waiting to fill the position," said Chiu.

His next plan is to travel to Norfolk, Va, to attend the orientation session of the program on Aug. 18.



Marine musicians open up for the "Queen of Salsa"

For the first time in her career, three-time Grammy Award winner Celia Cruz performed her contagious Latin rhythms in Hawaii, and two Marines from the Marine Forces Pacific Band received the opportunity to kick off the festivities during her concert celebrated at the Sheraton Waikiki Hotel, Hawaii Ballroom July 26.

Staff Sgt. Eddie Ortiz, trumpet section leader and Cpl. Joel Rubillo, a percussionist, with the MarForPac band, both play Latin music on their off time in a group called *Son Caribe*.

"It was an honor for us," said Ortiz. "It was the first time Celia Cruz ever performed in Hawaii and we were chosen to open the show. Honestly, I just don't have the words to describe that feeling. It was the opportunity of a lifetime to open for the 'Queen of Salsa.' It was unbelievable."

Although most people would be nervous to take the stage with such an accredited and world-renown artist, the two Marines rose to the challenge and entertained the crowd like it was any other gig.

"We were surprisingly relaxed," said Ortiz. "The band was well rehearsed, the sound check went well, so we felt comfortable when taking the stage."

Ortiz assembled the band, *Son Caribe*,

a little more than four months ago.

"I felt there was a big gap in the local Latin music scene," said Ortiz. "I'd played with several bands here, but I wasn't enjoying what I was playing, so I began arranging music for my own band."

This is a certain change for the two Marines who regularly entertain people by playing patriotic music for events on and off base.

"I really enjoy playing in this band," said Rubillo. "I get to meet a lot of interesting people and it's a change from the normal workday. Also, the dancers are amazing."

When playing music with *Son Caribe*, Ortiz and Rubillo have the opportunity to play Salsa, and a variety of Latin music.

"Salsa is a term which describes only a small portion of Latin music," said Ortiz. "We try to vary our styles of playing — Merengue, Cha-Cha's, Cumbia, Bachatas — as well as Salsa and Latin-pop."

The good thing about Latin music is that it isn't a fad, according to the musicians.

"It's cultural music that has always been around. It will never go out of style."

Anyone interested in Latin nightlife can see Ortiz, Rubillo and *Son Caribe* perform Sunday, Monday and Tuesday at the Sheraton Waikiki Esprit Club.


