Kailua hosts first travelling Sunset Fest

Thousands of Oahu residents converged on Kailua Beach Park Saturday and Sunday for the first ever Kailua "Sunset on the Beach" festival.

Waikiki made the Sunset on the Beach events famous, and the City and County of Honolulu plans to host the events in a different community one weekend each month as part of its 'Rediscover Oahu's Neighborhoods' program.

The events planned for Saturday were cut short because of rain. But, when the sun poked through the clouds Sunday, the festival came to life.

Kailua is the first in a series of traveling 'Sunset on the Beach' events and planners said Kailua may get another festival as the weather cut the events short.

Co-sponsored by the Kailua Chamber of Commerce, radio stations KCCN FM100 and Oldies 107.9, News 8 and K5, the event showcased Kailua Town -- from restaurants, businesses and entertainers to community organizations.

In addition to watching "Planet of the Apes" and "Grease" on the 30-foot screen just after sunset, guests were treated to the hospitality of more than 75 Kailua businesses.

Honolulu Mayor Jeremy Harris told guests

Sunday the events are not only intended to increase the economic development on Oahu, but they are about giving families something fun to do together.

"Where else can you go to the beach and watch a movie on the big screen?" asked "Planet of the Apes" star Keri Tagawa.

Tagawa, who also starred in "Mortal Combat" and other films, was just one of several celebrities on hand to sign autographs during the event.

Both films were shown Sunday evening as Planet of the Apes was cancelled Saturday because of the weather.

Free trolley shuttles connected public parking lots to Kailua Beach Park. Stops included Lanikai Elementary School, Kailua Intermediate School, Kailua Elementary School, Kailua Shopping Center, and Kailua Beach Park.

Each guest received a Kailua goodie bag filled with coupons, raffle forms and other goodies, and was encouraged to explore Kailua Town and its unique variety of shops.

"We may be coming back to Kailua sooner since this weekend was partly rained out, said John Fink, an 18-year resident of Kailua and general manager of KHNL News 8. "So many people worked very hard to make this event a success, and I think they should get another chance."

Fink said that although some of the events on Saturday afternoon were cancelled, the program still went better than planned.

T-Wolves narrowly defeat VP-9

The Es were getting frustrated on the court and began missing easy plays.

With only minutes left, the Es had to score at least a three-point shot to stay in the game.

"We need to force the ball. Time is running out," yelled Elton Garner of the Es during a timeout.

Garner backed up his words with a lay-up, but the T-Wolves were not going to lose after making a second half come back.

With only seconds left, the Es made one last attempt to score, but they fell short, and the T-Wolves come up with a 41 to 39 victory.
