BASE POOL SERVES AS HOCKEY ARENA

Hawaii doesn't have the benefits of frozen ponds during the winter, so people are not going out with hockey sticks and skates putting teams together for a pickup ice hockey game.

The water in Hawaii doesn't freeze, so hockey players don masks and fins and play at the bottom of a pool.

That's right — underwater hockey.

Every Saturday at 10:30 a.m., MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, lifeguards, and members of the University of Hawaii Underwater Hockey team, get together at the base pool for underwater slapstick.

"We started this because it is a good breath-hold exercise," said Harry Sprague, the water safety manager for the base.

"While performing rescues, lifeguards are subject to being held underwater by large waves for long periods of time. This exercise builds the confidence needed for a positive outcome for both the rescuer and rescued.

In the pool on Saturday mornings there are no drowning victims, but a game must be won.

When these groups of players get together, the teams are divided. Just like the pickup games on a frozen pond, the pool games are not played for statistics or trophies.

"Sticks up, go," yells the pointman from one team. On the word go, both teams swim frantically to the middle of the pool, where seven feet down, the puck awaits.

"Normally you only need to hold your breath for 10 to 20 seconds," said Jerard Jarden, one of the UH players. "Of course the more you play the better and longer you can hold your breath."

The games are played the width of the pool and play stops when a goal is scored. Scoring a goal can take anywhere from five minutes to upwards of 20.

With bellies against the bottom of the pool, players bat the puck around and pass to fellow teammates in order to score.

Currently there are an average of 18 players on Saturdays. Sprague invites any Marines or Sailors on base to join the players for a game of un-

derwater hockey.

Only one stipulation applies to playing underwater hockey.

"You have to come back three times before you can quit," said Erika Johnson, another UH player. "The first few games are hard, but you will eventually get the breathing down."

Morning dew was still on the grass and the florescence of the rising sun shone upon the 88 runners and one dog that participated in the Headquarters Bn. Surf & Turf 5K run Saturday.

The runners began and ended the run in front of the Kaneohe Officer's Club. They trotted through portions of the enlisted housing area, portions of the Klipper Golf Course, and sections of the beach along holes 13, 14 and 15.

"There was pretty nice scenery throughout the race," said Tina Oliver, who placed 3rd overall for the female division's. "But that stretch along the beach really hurt everyone's time."

Law affects license renewal

Hawaii State Director's Office

Tuesday, Governor Benjamin J. Cayetano will ceremoniously sign into law recently enacted legislation that links a man's application for a Hawaii state driver's license, or renewal, to his legal and civic obligation under Federal law to register with the Selective Service System.

Effective Jan. 1, the law requires that Hawaii men, 18 - 25 years old who are subject to registration under Federal law, be registered with the SSS. If they are not, the license application notifies them that Hawaii's Division of Motor Vehicles will forward information to the SSS for the purpose of registering them.

Men must register with the SSS before they can benefit from any state or Federal government programs.

The SSS is charged with being ready to draft men for military service in a national emergency. Virtually all young men living in the U.S. are required to register within 30 days of their 18th birthday

Failure to register is a felony. For more visit, www.sss.gov.
