# Buckaroos 'n cowgirls kick up the Fourth

Standing above the enraged bull, the cowboy wiped his brow, shook his head and quickly dropped onto the snorting giant.

The gate opened and dirt flew high into the air, as the bull ran into the center of the rodeo, kicking and bucking in every direction.

With nerves of steel, the cowboy desperately gripped the bull, as he was thrown every which way, resembling a rag doll, knowing that every second counted.

Finally, after what seemed an eternity, the cowboy was flung into the air, landing mere inches from the bucking bull.

The beast won this time, but it was a good ride.

This was just one of the events that Oahu residents and service members enjoyed July 4, at the Fourth of July All-Star Rodeo hosted by the New Town and Country Stables in Waimanalo.

The rodeo brought a crowd of more than 5,000 patriotic spectators to celebrate and witness one of America's most time-honored sporting events, complete with cowboys attempting to rope, wrangle and ride bucking broncos and muscle-bound bulls.

A benefit for Therapeutic Horsemanship of Hawaii, a non-profit organization, the event helped train participants with special needs about the skills of horsemanship and riding.

The Naturally Hawaiian Gallery Learning Center, was another benefit sponsor. The school provides art classes and workshops in various subjects, as well as instruction in

riding, said Patrick Ching, event coordinator and owner.

The day's events included bareback and saddle bronco riding, barrel racing, a rodeo clown hoedown, team steer roping, a cowboy hula bull and, the most-anticipated event, bull riding.

Children participated in the keiki barrel and a stick pony races, both held in between events in the corral.

Josh Rees, a former Marine stationed at MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, was among the many cowboys who came out to participate in the rodeo.

Rees, originally from Texas, not only competed in the bareback bronco riding event, but also entertained the audience as a rodeo clown.

"This was what I grew up around," said spectator Cpl. Russell King, a flight equipment technician with Marine Aviation Logistics Squadron 24. "It's a part of life in

San Antonio. Coming here made me feel closer to home.

"Although it's different than in Texas, it's still great. Bull riding is the best part."

According to Ching, many of the riders in the bull riding competition were service members from all around Oahu, including soldiers, Sailors and Marines.

Excitement rushed through the crowd like an electric current, as the bull-riding event began.

Cheers and hollers erupted from the crowd each time a cowboy was flung from his bull.

The extreme sport of bull riding consists of a rider averaging between 150 to 200 pounds and attempting to command a 1,500- to 1,800-pound bucking, muscle-bound bull for the better of an eight-second ride.

Lance Cpl. Mike Morgan, a warehouse chief with MAG-24, rode One Eye Jack in the bull riding event. Although Morgan only lasted a few seconds before being

flipped into the air, he walked out of the rodeo only slightly bruised and completely content with his ride.

"I grew up in the country riding steers. This was only my third time riding a bull," said Morgan. "I might not have cleared, but this was the best ride I've had so far."

Morgan became involved with bull riding at the New Town and Country Stables during his free time. Originally part of a team, he now competes individually.

"I was the only Marine out here today. The rest of the military guys were Army and Navy. Maybe next time some more Marines will come out."

"This rodeo is the best one they have had out here," said Morgan. "They need to have more of these."



Though many families came to enjoy the concert and free food, above all they heard a message of faith loud and clear.




Above — Audience members participate in the Base Chapel concert with several rounds of "the wave."

# \$3.7 million now available to many military spouses for completing degree programs

MANASSAS, Va. — More than two thousand military spouses will now be able to continue their undergraduate education free of charge.

"I'm extremely happy," said Robin Jourdan, a Marine Corps wife whose husband is a sergeant stationed at MCB Quantico, Va. "I've wanted to finish my degree; now I have the opportunity to do it."

Army spouse Lora Diem was ecstatic when her husband, who recruits in Southern California, told her about the program.

"I had to stop my education because I had to go work," explained Diem. "Now I can do both."

Jourdan and Diem are among the first to participate in the American Military University (AMU) Spouse Schoolmates Scholarship Program.

American Military University is an online distance learning university that offers a wide range of degree programs.

Because their husbands are enrolled at AMU, Jourdan and Diem are able to take courses for absolutely no charge. The AMU program is providing 2,500 spouse scholarships, which amounts to some \$3.7 million in grants for undergraduate education in 2002.

Robin Dickinson is a Navy wife whose husband is currently serving in Hawaii. She said the chance to go to school for free is "wonderful" and "a dream come true." And like all the spouses in the program, she said the flexibility that online education provides is its biggest benefit.

Jourdan knows how the demands of the military spouse can get in the way of pursuing a degree.

"I stopped and started college twice," she explained. "Now I can finish."

Chancellor Jim Etter formally launched the university's Spouse Schoolmates Scholarship Program July 2 at a "kick-off" at the Army and Navy Club in Washington, D.C.

"AMU's Spouse Schoolmates Scholarship Program is set," announced Terry Grant, the program director and a former Marine spouse. "We have effectively enrolled more than two dozen spouses, ready for class."

"According to the

Military Family Resource Center studies, there is a huge need for increased levels of spouse education," he continued. "AMU is responding to that need."

The American Military University was founded in 1991 and is the flagship component of American Public University System.

The APUS corporate offices are in Charles Town, W.Va., with administrative facilities in Manassas, Va.

As part of APUS, the university offers Associate's, Bachelor's and Master's degrees in more than 50 programs from business administration to naval warfare.


