



## Troops to Teachers program clarifies changes in focus

The Troops to Teachers program's primary objective is to help make quality teachers available for high-need schools and high-need school districts throughout America.

This goal reflects the requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, which authorizes the continuation of TTT through Fiscal Year 2006.

Pending availability of funds, financial assistance may be provided to eligible individuals as stipends up to \$5,000 to help pay for teacher certification costs or as bonuses of \$10,000.

Stipend and bonus recipients must agree to teach for three years in school locations that meet certain Department of Education criteria.

The maximum amount of assistance is \$10,000 per person.

### Specific requirements:

— Stipends of up to \$5,000 are available to reimburse costs associated with becoming certified to teach. Recipients of these stipends must agree to teach for three years in a school located in a "high-need" district.

— Bonuses of \$10,000 are available to those who agree to teach for three years in a school that serves a high percentage of students from low-income families.

Individuals interested in identifying schools or school districts that meet the high-need criteria may contact TTT.

The program continues to pursue the goal of helping to relieve teacher shortages, especially in math, science, special education and other high needs subject areas, and to assist military personnel in making successful transitions to second careers in teaching.

## New West Nile Virus races towards Hawaii

In 1999 West Nile Virus, a disease of humans, mammals and birds, was first discovered in New York City. At the close of 2001, the range of WNV had expanded to include most states east of the Mississippi River, Ontario, Canada and the Cayman Islands in the Caribbean.

So far this year, WNV activity continues throughout the east and was recently detected in the state of Texas. It is widely accepted that the rapid spread of the virus across the continent is due to the migration of wild birds.

With activity so far west so early in 2002, many experts feel confident that WNV could invade the Pacific Coast states by 2003.

Symptoms of mild WNV infection include fever, head and body aches, and more severe infections can cause inflammation of the brain with symptoms ranging from high fever, neck stiffness, disorientation, convulsions, muscle weakness, to coma, paralysis and even death.

West Nile Virus has many characteristics that make it particularly hazardous to human and animal health. Although primarily a bird virus, it can survive within many domestic and wild bird species for long periods without causing sickness.

The virus is carried between birds by mosquitoes, which also carry it from infected birds to mammals and humans. Birds newly-infected with the virus have an

exceptionally long period for which they are infectious to mosquitoes, up to 100 days.

West Nile virus can also be transmitted from an adult mosquito female to her offspring, which means that the virus can be maintained in mosquito populations even without birds.

However, transmission of the virus from person to person or from bird to human is extremely unlikely.

The climate of the Hawaiian Islands makes it ideal for people as well as future epidemics of WNV.

The virus could be introduced into the state via infected birds or mosquitoes hitchhiking on commercial airliners.

There is little restriction on the importation of domestic fowl from the mainland and, in fact, one can still import live fowl from the eastern states.

Hawaii has eight mosquito species, three of which are known carriers of the WNV.

One species, the common house mosquito, is already a vector of dog heartworm and avian malaria in Hawaii and it has the widest distribution of any mosquito in the islands.

Another known vector is the Asian tiger mosquito, which is also common throughout the islands and is a vicious human biter.

Control of WNV depends heavily on rapidly detecting virus in birds and mosquitoes so that mosquito control efforts can prevent epidemics. For more information, call 433-6693.
