

At 4:30 p.m., July 13, while some people were going home to begin their weekend, more than 5,000 traveled to the Marine Corps Air Facility, MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay.

On Saturday, instead of going to the beach, more than 16,500 people spent their day near Hangar 101.

Sunday, the numbers dropped a bit, but close to 10,000 people still made it to the landing zone.

The attraction was not an air show or viewing of a new military aircraft, but the largest carnival on Windward Oahu, BayFest 2001.

BayFest 2001 had many firsts, to include the highest attendance in five years, according to Debbie Aisoff, public relations coordinator

for Marine Corps Community Service's marketing department.

Before the gates to BayFest opened, more than \$74,000 was sold through presale tickets. Headquarters Bn., MCB Hawaii, had sold 800 tickets — more than any other unit on base, and the MCCS Cash Office had sold 1,313 — more than any other MCCS activity.

Ticket holders began to flock to the park Friday at 5 p.m. Teenagers filled their mouths with cotton candy and soda and then dashed to the fastest, stomach-turning ride at the festival.

Couples could be seen by the games, while the husband or boyfriend attempted to win his wife or girlfriend a stuffed dog.

Hangar 101, the home for HMH-362 Ugly Angels, was turned into the Island Lifestyle Expo. Everyday of BayFest, close to 50 of the local businesses on the island setup displays for the people attending BayFest.

A popular stop was at the

McKenna Motors booth, where if someone had a good aim and the best paper airplane, they might win a humvee.

Throwing the paper plane from 50 feet away into a whole in the vehicle was the challenge, but Cpl. Jon Harwell from 3rd Marine Regiment overcame to win the humvee.


Outside around the park, there were a variety of rides and games to keep everyone entertained. Also, food booths were scattered for those with a sweet tooth or just looking for something to drink.

BayFest hosts Oahu's amateurs, pros in bouts

As the sun began to set over the mountains on the Windward side Saturday, the Boxing Challenge at BayFest 2001, on MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, kicked off with 12 bouts of amateur boxing.

Boxing gyms from all over the island brought their fighters to the challenge to showcase their speed, power and endurance in the ring.

The first four bouts were amateur fights with no titles on the line, ranging from the 147 to the 178-pound weight classes.

The final eight fights were championship fights. Each fight consisted of three, two-minute rounds.

Olympic style judging was used. The boxers had to use gloves with a white surface over the front of the glove. This white portion is the only part of the glove that they can score with.

Although there was no trophy involved in the first four fights, each boxer still put all his best effort into each of the three rounds.

Phil Ramirez of the Kalakaua Boxing Club put so much effort into his fight that he was the first boxer in the challenge to knockout his opponent, Tony Madolora of the Wahiawa Boxing Club.

"It was great to win with a knockout. Most of the time with these short rounds, the winner is determined by points, but I am very happy with this," Ramirez said after his win.

As the fights went on, the level of intensity continued to rise.

One of the most intense fights during the challenge was the 201+ weight-class championship fight. This fight made Tito Scanlan of the Hawaii Warriors Boxing Club use his speed to attempt to defeat his larger opponent, Ali Burgess of the Palolo Boxing Club. Burgess had a weight advantage of more than 30 pounds.

Burgess came out swinging and his power was enough to knock Scanlan back with every hit. Scanlan was able to dodge many of his hits.

In the second round, Scanlan's speed and power sent Burgess to the mat, but that wasn't the end of the fight. By the third round, both fighters showed fatigue and Burgess turned up the amount of throws.

"This was the toughest fight I have ever had. [Tito] was very good and very fast. After the first knockdown, I thought he was going to win, but I wasn't going to give up," said Burgess.

After the bell rang for the final time, it was Burgess that came out victorious.

By 8:30 p.m., 24 boxers entered the ring, but only 12 of them left victorious. Although this sport can be very brutal, as boxers left the ring with bloody noses and bruises, they always congratulated one another at the end of every fight.

With all twelve bouts finished, the crowd dispersed back to the carnival rides or to find a seat for the laser light show — not one spectator forgetting the efforts of these warriors of the ring.

USO Hawaii Hosts 10K and 5K at Wheeler

This year, the Army's 25th Infantry Division is serving as host to USO Hawaii's annual, major fundraiser, a 10K and a 5K race-walk, Aug. 12. at Wheeler Army Air Field.

Both races will start at 7 a.m.; the 10K covers 6.2 miles and the 5K covers 3.1 miles. Both are also open to the public. and promise to be bigger and better than ever.

The 10K course will include the runway in "The Gulch," a hidden area from which a few U.S. fighter planes were able to get into the air during the Dec. 7, 1941, attack.

The race director will be retired Marine Corps Brig. Gen. Dick Vercauteren, an avid runner.

Brigadier Gen. Vercauteren said the event will be enjoyable for all categories of participants, from hard-core athletes to stroller pushers who may want to amble the 5K at a casual pace. Also, groups of five to 10 runners may form civilian or military teams for the 10K

Awards will be presented to the top individual and team competitors. As well, all finishers who either walk or run in the 10K or 5K races will be entered into the drawing for thousands of dollars in door prizes.

The grand prize is a trip for two to Disney's California Adventure — complete with air fare, hotel accommodations and park passes.

Sister Hazel electrifies BayFest audience

More than 10,000 people packed into a small corner of the MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, flightline Saturday night to yell, scream and cheer for the contemporary rock band Sister Hazel during BayFest 2001.

The enthusiastic crowd fueled the Gainesville, Fla., band into giving the BayFest participants a concert they would not soon forget.

"I was actually a military brat for 25 years," lead singer, Ken Block told the BayFest crowd. The statement drew an immediate response of yells and cheers from the fans.

Sister Hazel provided the BayFest fans with an electrifying performance that included some of the bands biggest songs including "All for you" and "Change your mind."

Actually, Sister Hazel has done many concerts to show its support of the Armed Services.

"We did a show in Okinawa about a year ago," said Mark Trojanowski, the bands' drummer. "It was an awesome experience, but that was one long trip."

Also, while performing last year in Jacksonville, N.C., the band took time to set up a show at nearby Camp Lejeune as well.

"That was a crazy show," said Trojanowski. "There were about 60,000 people at the Camp Lejeune show, and since it was a hot summer day, paramedics had to treat a lot of people for heat exhaustion.

The future for Sister Hazel looks busy as the band is already set to appear for a show in Atlanta Ga., tomorrow.

In November, the band is scheduled to go to Korea and perform seven shows for servicemembers stationed there, according to Trojanowski.

It would seem the members of Sister Hazel know that not only do they gain a large, loyal fan base by doing shows for servicemembers overseas, but they also know it's good advertising as well.

"We know people in the military move around a lot," said Trojanowski. "So it would be cool if they would pass the word about us, and come out to see our shows."
