Camp Smith Marines gather for annual cookout

CAMP H.M. SMITH – The servicemembers and civilians of Marine Forces Pacific gathered with their families Friday in one of the largest annual festivities here at Bordelon Field.

The servicemembers of Headquarters and Service Bn. pulled together as a team to provide a full afternoon of events this year, complemented by a bright and sunny day.

"We don't always get a chance to see each other like this," said Sgt. Ato Ando, a contracts and acquisition specialist for the battalion. "Everyone really seemed to enjoy themselves. I've been here for three years and this is the best family day yet."

The afternoon officially kicked off as a cooked four-foot long Kalua pig was brought to the picnic table. Lieutenant Gen. Frank Libutti, the MarForPac commander, blessed the afternoon meal before it was served along with a large assortment of picnic entrees.

"This is the kind of stuff that people have to make time for," said Staff Sgt. Clay Barber, the helpdesk staff noncommissioned officer at MarForPac. "It's good for the morale of the Marines."

The afternoon continued with sounds from MarForPac's "Combo

Band. Static displays were also available, to include a CH-53D helicopter flown in by the "Red Lions" of Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 363, and a Light Armored Vehicle driven by the Marines of 1st Radio Bn. from MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay. Other static displays included weapons from the Staff Noncommissioned Officers Academy as well as an entertaining dunk tank and bouncy houses for the younger family members. Key Volunteers also treated the children to face painting, as well as popcorn and shaved ice.

"The children really enjoyed themselves," said Rosa Paige, a Marine wife. "This has been one of the best Marine Corps communities I've been with. It seems to me that the command goes out of its way to include family members in planned events."

The military police of K-Bay provided guests with a military working-dog presentation, followed by several competitive events in which each work section of MarForPac provided teams. Many sections





Windwalkers stomp Bumbaclots, in 19-1 lashing

The Marine Helicopter Training Squadron 301 "Windwalkers," defeated the 1st Radio Bn. "Bumbaclots," in a 19 to 1 mauling Monday evening at Annex Field.

The Windwalkers were able to pick apart the Bumbaclots, earning their first win of the season.

Due to a late registration, their record now stands at 1-3.

"We only have five guys from last year's team," said Windwalkers coach Bobby Boyd. "These guys came along way and are playing better as a team."

Boyd attributed the team's win to its outstanding teamwork.

Low pitches from Bumbaclots pitcher Peter Novall, loaded the bases early by walking the first three Windwalker hitters.

Once Novall began tossing the ball squarely over the plate, the Windwalkers no longer had a leg to stand on.

Using the batting skills that the Windwalkers worked on during practice helped to make up for Novall's pitching prowess.

"Our batting hurt us the first three games, but it's looking good now," said Boyd.

Big hits only count if the ball drops into a hole in the defense and the quickness of Windwalkers right center fielder

Desto Delao, and shortstop Matthew Allen, prevented several Bumbaclots hits from counting.

By the top of the fourth inning, the Windwalkers lead ten to zero.

They had their own breed of defensive outfielders, like left fielder Rick Palliam. After a bad pitch from Windwalker's Mark McInturff, his teammates still stood behind him.

"Come one, play smart!," yelled Tim Klecker, an extra batter for the Windwalkers.

To end the game in a "slaughter rule," one team has to have a 15-point lead over their opponents at the end of the fifth, the Windwalkers could have played it safe and hit short, but that was not the way they intended to finish.


When second baseman, Russell Heath approached the plate, there was only one place he wanted to send the ball — rocketing over the fence.

Though he didn't point to the direction of his shot like baseball


legend Babe Ruth, he was able to smash the ball, sending it hurtling over the left field fence.

At the bottom of the fifth inning, the Windwalkers were still holding the Bumbaclots to one run.

They then upped their lead to 19 runs, thus achieving victory via the "slaughter rule."
