Windward Oahu's largest festival to offer fun for all

Mornin', day and night, K-Bay's 12th annual carnival to delight, thrill with variety of events

Every summer for the past eleven years, MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, turns a portion of its air facility into the site for the largest annual festival on Windward Oahu.

This year is no different as Ocean Concepts Hawaii presents the 12th Annual BayFest, July 13-15, at the Marine Corps Air Facility.

Not only does this event provide entertainment for the base and surrounding communities, but it also benefits the units on base.

Some of the money raised from BayFest is distributed amongst the eight different tenant commands on the base, said Debbie Aisoff, Marine

Corps Community Services public relations coordinator. Last year, more than \$20,000 was divided between those commands.

Another way for units to receive money from BayFest is through pre-sale tickets, which are available through unit representatives or the Marine Corps Exchange Cash Cage. These tickets are sold at \$6, to include the admission of one person, three ride tickets and two pizza coupons from Papa John's Pizza, and are valued at \$33.

Plus, when they are bought, \$2 goes toward the selling unit's party fund. Besides the benefits that BayFest provides for the base and individual units, there are a plethora of events that are suited for all ages.

For the athletic buffs, BayFest is holding a five-kilometer run to kick off the three days of festivities. The following day, the Europa Sports Body Search Fitness Competition and a strongman competition are slated to be held.

The children will be taken care of too. They can go in the Bounce House or attend the Keiki PlayFest.

Since BayFest is open to the public, different units will be showing some of the equipment they use for training. One of the attractions is a capability demonstration by Radio Reconnaissance Platoon, Bravo Co., 1st Radio Bn, where they will be extracted from Kaneohe Bay by a CH-53D "Sea Stallion" helicopter.

BayFest also features E.K Fernandez Carnival rides.

A popular event in the past, the fireworks show has attracted people to the festival, but this year there is a new attraction replacing the fireworks. Laser Fantasy International is bringing their world-renowned laser light show to K-Bay every night.

Other featured events include the variety of live musical entertainment: musical talent ranges from groups such as Sister Hazel to Xscape. On Sunday, local bands will perform for "Shaka Sunday."

There are many other events and contests that people can participate in.




The more reading logs participants turn in, the more coupons and changes to win free books they will gain.

Pick-up games rebound with fervor, intensity at K-Bay Semper Fit Center

Ten men skillfully run up and down a hardwood floored arena, dodging their opponent's attempts to stop them from soaring through the air toward the basket.

In the process, they risk being knocked down by their opponent while soaring to the hoop. The risk pays off as the other team regains control of the ball.

Intramural games have referees present to call any penalty. The "pick-up" games rely on the integrity of the players to call fouls and admit if they committed a violation.

These men play in teams of five, and the winning team stays on to challenge the next group of five. This is the way the pick-up games at the basketball courts at the Semper Fit Center run.

All games are based on the integrity of the players to call fouls, violations or any other penalty. These guys aren't playing for a trophy or championship, they are playing for the thrill of the sport.

"These games are more intense than league games," said Cody Walker. "The skill levels vary and no game is the same."

Players from different units on base

come to the gym to test their skills against other players.

Some of the players may not jump as high as others or be able to dribble circles around their opposition. But everyone here plays hard.

Nearly everyday, the gym is filled with players on each court and another two to three teams waiting on the sidelines.


By 5 p.m., the games are in full swing and waiting lists can put people on the side for 30 minutes to an hour. Though they only play up to ten, the games can last almost as long as an intramural basketball game.

The pick-up games move faster and there are fewer delays. When one player pulls down a rebound, his team is racing toward their basket.

Ten players in constant movement back and forth, bolting from one basket to another trying to score that tenth basket.

In the end, only one team earns the right to stay on the court. The other team must wait for another turn or go home.

Unlike the league play, when a team loses, there is always another day and another team that they can attempt to defeat and earn the right to play on the court again.

Four limited-seating, historic boat tours will be offered, and a National Park Service ranger will present oral histories of Pearl Harbor during the one-hour tours.

The ride will give passengers the chance to see many historic sites and buildings that played a significant role during the 1941 attack on the harbor. The route

will also pass by the USS Missouri, a decommissioned World War II battleship now permanently moored in Pearl Harbor. Additionally, the shuttle will take time to honor the USS Utah and her brave crew.

The 9:30 a.m. and 11 a.m. tours, titled "Query as to Why?", will reveal the answers to the many questions people ask about the attack on Pearl Harbor.

The 12:30 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. tours, titled "Fishponds to Battleships," will look at the geological formation of Pearl Harbor from its importance to native Hawaiians and, subsequently, to its strategic significance to the U.S. military.

The tours are being offered free of charge; however, reservations are a must. Sign-up before 3 p.m., Friday.
