If Martin Luther King Jr. were alive today, what would he say about the global issues facing our world?

Would he be proud of the accomplishments of this nation? Would he believe that we have reached his goal and could proclaim those famous words "Free at last. Free at last. Thank God Almighty, we are free at last."

Or, would he see the ignorance and poverty that still exist in this country, and cry out for humanity to unite in helping all those who are unfortunate? Or, would he scream at the injustices that occur every day in our country and around the globe?

With all that has occurred in the last twenty years, what would he think?

These were some of the topics that guest speaker Navy Chaplain (Cmdr.) Jeffrey Rhodes, deputy Marine Forces Pacific chaplain, tackled during MCB Hawaii's culmination of Black History Month activities at a Feb. 28 dinner and dance at the Fairways Club ballroom at Kaneohe Bay. Throughout

February, the African-American Heritage Committee provided various events to embrace the 2003 Black History Month theme: "Understanding Our Past, Living Today, and Creating Our Future."

Navy Chaplain (Lt. j.g.) Winnie Walmsley opened the night's festivities with an invocation. She was followed by the enchanting intonations of Stacy Humphrey singing the "Eyes of the Sparrow."

Keeping the cultural creativity high, Mrs. Kimetta Hairston, a professor at the University of Hawaii and a full-time Ph.D. student, read her own poem about the importance of multicultural education in a teacher's classroom.

"Multicultural education not only teaches children about other cultures, but it also brings them together," said Hairston. "Children don't get a chance to celebrate Black History Month in school; they just don't do it here in schools.

"So, I think it is wonderful that they are doing this here on base."

Following the poem, Rhodes gave an uplifting, although true-to-life, speech about Martin Luther King Jr.'s life and views, discussing what he would say

about the situation the nation has found itself in, and the state of the world today.

In honor of Maya Angelou, one of the great African-American poets of the 20th century, Nico Duncan, a civilian payroll technician with the Comptroller Department, MCB Hawaii, came to the podium and recited "Phenomenal Woman."

The last event of the evening — prior to a scrumptious, down-home southern cooked meal of cornbread, black-eyed peas, collard greens, fried chicken, ribs and more — was the funky musical stylings of 11-year-old Symone Jenkins, a student at Mokapu Elementary School aboard Kaneohe Bay, with the song "Video" by India Arie.

Brig. Gen. Jerry C. McAbee, commanding general of MCB Hawaii, said he was moved by the celebration and remarks.

"I think the chaplain's speech about Martin Luther King and what he would do today, touched me the most. It wasn't just about the past," the general said, "but also was speaking in terms of the future. That is what will make tomorrow."

A few lucky guests won door prizes at the event, which were awarded during dinner. They included a poster of "A Negro Regiment in Action" from *Harper's Weekly*, and an African American cookbook.

The remainder of the evening was filled with laughter and dancing as the clock wound down on 2003's Black History Month cultural celebrations.

## Credit reports help fight I.D. theft

Real-life con artist of "Catch Me if You Can" fame provides valuable tips to deter criminals

If you want to know how to stop identity thief, it may help to ask a man who cashed \$2.5 million in bad checks before his 21st birthday.

"A consumer's best plan for protecting their identity is to monitor their credit history," said Frank Abagnale, master con man turned consultant, whose tale is now a major motion picture, "Catch Me If You Can." "The more often you check your credit, the less likely you are to lose it," he said.

So how do you monitor your history? One way is with technology. A number of today's security tools automatically monitor credit standings and inquiries made about credit histories. To help consumers use such tools effectively, the Privacy Guard agency offers this list of questions to consider:

- Does the service provide a credit report from all of the three major bureaus: Experian, Equifax and Trans Union? It should, since each bureau maintains its own separate records.
- Is all information combined on one report? Look for a service that com-

bines the data into what's called a triple bureau merged report.

- How often will you receive automatic updates? Some services offer quarterly, monthly or daily reporting whenever a new credit line is opened in your name, when derogatory information is entered in your record, or when a company asks to look at your record.

- Are credit scores included in the report? The majority of lenders use some sort of credit scoring model to help predict what kind of credit risk you are.

- How often can you request a credit report without paying extra? Some services charge for a report generated more than once a year.

- How are credit reports delivered? Some consumers prefer online delivery while others want their report sent through the U.S. Postal Service.

- Is identity theft insurance available? This coverage can cover certain expenses you have to pay if your identity is stolen.

- Is help available in understanding your credit report or in recovering from identity theft? Look for a service that provides customer service and counseling.

# Profile

## Colonel Jeanette I. Sustad

(Editor's Note: March is Women's History Month. Look for profiles recognizing who's who in Marine Corps history.)

The sixth director of Women Marines, Col. Jeanette I. Sustad was born in Minneapolis, Minn., but moved with her parents at an early age to Tacoma, Wash., where she graduated from Stadium High School. She earned a B.A. in Sociology at the University of Washington in Seattle in 1943.

Sustad joined the Marine Corps on May 8, 1943, just three months after the Corps began to accept women for enlistment in the new Women's Reserve Program. She received officer training at Camp Lejeune, N.C. and was commissioned a reserve second lieutenant on Dec. 27, 1943. Her first assignment was as field operations officer at the Marine Corps Auxiliary Air Facility, Oak Grove, N.C.

In May 1945, she was assigned as communications watch officer at Marine Corps Air Station, Oahu, Hawaii, and served in that capacity until she was assigned to inactive duty status in December 1945.

Following demobilization, she spent

a year in graduate study at the University of Minnesota, but upon passage of the Women's Armed Services Integration Act in 1948, she accepted a regular commission as a first lieutenant and reported to Headquarters Marine Corps in December 1948.

In Parris Island, S.C., in January 1949, she served as executive officer of the newly formed Women's Recruit Training Battalion. She was promoted to captain in August 1949.

From May until July 1950, she served as executive officer, Women Officers Training Detachment, Quantico, Va. Captain Sustad then became adjutant of MCB Camp Pendleton, Calif., and upon activation of the first post-World War II Women Marine Company at Camp Pendleton, she became its commanding officer until August 1952.

Sustad was named monitor in the Staff Message Control Branch, Headquarters, U.S. European Command, Frankfurt, Germany. After her promotion to major in July 1953, she became assistant head of the branch.

Upon returning to the U.S. in September 1954, she served as executive officer of the Women's Recruit

Training Battalion, Parris Island, followed by tours as officer in charge of the Procurement Aids Branch, Headquarters, 9th Marine Corps District, Chicago, Ill.; assistant to the executive officer and Plans officer, G-1 Division, HQMC; and as operations officer of the Marine Corps Educational Center, Quantico.

Sustad was promoted to lieutenant colonel in September 1962, while stationed at HQMC. She became the first full-time deputy director of Women Marines in July 1965, and served in that capacity until November 1967.

From December 1967 until January 1969, she served as assistant G-1, MCB Camp Pendleton. She was promoted to her final rank on April 11, 1968.

Sustad retired from active duty on Jan. 31, 1973. She received the Legion of Merit from the Commandant of the Marine Corps, for exceptionally meritorious performance of outstanding service as director of Women Marines from February 1969 through January 1973.

Sustad died Feb. 5, 1978.
