## MALSEK's Navy/Marine team aids Kainalu Elementary School

**KAILUA** — Marine Aviation Logistics Support Element, Kaneohe's Navy/Marine Corps team spirit was in full effect last week as more than 20 Marines and Sailors from the command helped Kainalu Elementary School with its annual Jog-A-Thon event.

Members of the K-Bay unit lent the school a helping hand as part of the Adopt-A-School program in which MCB Hawaii units "adopt" and aid Oahu schools with everything from tutoring to school fundraisers.

This four-hour event entailed Kainalu students running laps on a near quarter-mile oval area on the playground to help raise funds to purchase new playground equipment for the campus, according to Sherri Phillips, the Kainalu Jog-A-Thon coordinator. Prior to the event, students asked friends and family members to donate a certain amount of money for every lap they ran — and nearly every student participated in the event to help the school's cause.

With more than 500 children from ages 6-12 running around the school, the school's staff needed help maintaining positive

control of the running masses. "This is definitely a big project for us, so we called in the Marines," Phillips added.

And MALSEK's "911 force in readiness" heeded that call.

"We always call the (Marines and Sailors) over to help — and they always come through for us," Phillips said. "We couldn't have done this today without them."

According to Gunnery Sgt. Joe McIlhenney, operations section staff noncommissioned officer in charge and MALSEK Adopt-A-School program coordinator, helping with events establishes relationships with community schools by positively influencing its youth and also helping servicemembers discover the benefits of volunteering.

"Events like this one help the (Marines and Sailors) realize that these children look up to them and the standards of excellence they set," said McIlhenney, who has worked with the school through the program for nearly five years.

"To me, it's important to have good relations between the Marine Corps and the community," said Lt.Col. Mark S. Shafer, the MALSEK commanding officer. "The Marines and Sailors are positive role models

for these children and activities like this one help them get a good sense of what the Marine Corps is all about."

During the event, MALSEK personnel helped the children with warm up activities in the form of traditional Marine Corps "daily seven" exercise routines and also helped motivate the children to run more laps during the activity. Marines and Sailors also helped the children keep track of the number of laps they ran.

While most MALSEK volunteers motivated the children in their endeavors, one volunteer received motivation from working with them.

"It really motivates you to do your job better when you see who you're protecting," said Petty Officer 2nd Class Daryl Danielowicz, a MALSEK aviation storekeeper. "When you work a lot of hours and you don't get paid any more, (working with children) really helps you understand why — we're responsible for defending them."

Phillips said Kainalu Elementary School plans on using the Marines' and Sailors' help when the school begins installing its new playground equipment when the state government gives school officials the "OK."





# Tournament competitors go for gold

Bowlers from MCB Hawaii dueled it out in the alleys of K-Bay Lanes last week during a three-day scratch bowling tournament.

No one spared the strikes as 11 Marines battled to win a place on an island all-Marine team.

Although there were trophies for the best six bowlers, the bowler with the highest game and the bowler with the best three-game combination, the ultimate goal for these Marines was to make the team.

"We were looking for the best Marine bowlers in the scratch division so that we could take the top six and compete in the Hawaii All-military Scratch Tournament next month," said tournament coordinator Deborah Bruns.

The rollers threw 8 games a day from Tuesday to Thursday to see who could get the highest total score in three days.

Action was fast and furious during the tournament, and when the rosin finally settled on Thursday afternoon only the top six bowlers made the team.

With an average score of 198.33 for 24 games Gunnery Sgt. Eugene R. Stahl of MALSEK, came out on top of

the competition and secured himself a spot on the squad.

Although he finished second, and was able to win a spot to play in the upcoming tournament, Gunnery Sgt. Derrick M. Hurd of MALSEK walked away with top honors for the highest game and the most points for a three game series.

"Those who came out and rolled did a very fine job, and because of that we got a very fine selection of Marines for the team," said Master Gunnery Sgt. Leo Oller, coach of the All-Marine Hawaii bowling team. "If these guys bowl during the tournament next month like they did here, we have a very good chance of winning."

For the past three years Oller has played in the Hawaii All-military Scratch Tournament. This year he thinks the Marines can bring home the top honors.

"We got a good mixture of individuals that can really do the job this year, and if these guys can bowl at the other alleys like they did here we should do real well," said Oller.

The rest of Oller's bowling team consists of David Pettet, Jeremy Hinkhouse, Lee Rosenthal and Frank Cochrun.

These six Marines scratched their way to the top of this K-Bay Lanes tournament, and having done that, their goal is to win the big all-military competition next month.
