The courtyard at Mokapu Mall came alive, Saturday, with the sights, sounds, tastes, smells and feel of the Asia Pacific as MCB Hawaii celebrated Asian-Pacific American Heritage Month.

The lunchtime festival, aimed at sharing some of the vast diversity found throughout Asia and the Pacific, included representatives from several groups throughout the region.

“The Great Flame in the Water,” a local song and dance review, kicked off the festivities with a blend of Polynesian and Tahitian music and dancing which gave the event a true “island” feel. Several members of the audience couldn’t resist the urge to dance and joined the performers on stage near the end of the show.

If the music and dancing weren’t enough to make the guests forget they were on a Marine Corps base, Hawaii’s Japanese Wives Club was there to help. Not only did they provide a display of some of the utensils of Japanese culture, they gave festival guests and mall customers a taste of Japanese cuisine. Okonomiyaki, a pancake-type food made with cabbage and a variety of meats and other vegetables, was a big hit with the crowd, and the group didn’t stop serving until the festival was over and the tent came down.

A celebration of culture from around the Pacific wouldn’t be complete without a martial arts demonstration, and this festival included two.

The MCB Hawaii branch of the Okinawa Kenpo Karate Kobudo group included enthusiasts of all ages whom demonstrated their skills and educated the crowd with a brief history of their art.

The Chinese Physical Culture Association, Hawaii’s oldest kung fu group, also performed at the event and wrapped up the celebration with what turned out to be the biggest attraction for the children: a Chinese lion dance.

“Asian-Pacific Americans are a very diverse group of people,” said Master Sgt. Duane A. Keys, MCB Hawaii equal opportunity advisor. “There are so many different cultures and lifestyles that a festival like this is the only way to highlight the diversity of this group.”

Each group took time during their performance to explain the history and culture behind what they were doing.

According to the most recent U.S. Census data, Asians and Pacific islanders make up more than 4 percent of the population in the United States and U.S.-associated Pacific island jurisdictions. That number is expected to rise to more than 10 percent by 2050.

Asian-Pacific Americans make up the fastest-growing segment of American society, and they’re also the group with which the U.S. Pacific Command interacts most.

“This festival helps everyone realize that when we are stationed away from the mainland, there is a lot going on outside the base or station community,” Keys added. “It’s a great opportunity to learn about the culture of the people with whom we interact, and that makes us all better people.”

## Triathletes endure rigors of swimming, running, biking at 5th Annual Triathlon/Duathlon

More than 300 athletes participated in the Marine Corps Community Services and 1st Marine Air Wing Aviation Support Element 5th Annual Triathlon/ Duathlon aboard MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe, Saturday morning.

The event was coordinated with the Honolulu Chamber of Commerce and purposely scheduled to take place during Military Appreciation Week, according to Maj. Bob Krekel, Operations Officer, Marine Aviation Logistics Support Element Kaneohe.

The event was open to all military personnel, family members and civilians, and participants entered the event in individual or team categories.

To complete the race, triathletes had to swim 800 meters in Kaneohe Bay, bike 11.1 miles and run 3.5 miles.

Participants in the duathlon started their race with a two-mile run then went on to the 11.5-mile bike race and finished with a 3.5-mile run. The race started and finished near the MCB Hawaii Marina.

Many civilian triathletes enter the race to help them prepare for local Iron Man events that often take place here in Hawaii, according to Krekel.

"I would say about 60 to 70 percent of the participants are civilians from the state of Hawaii," said Krekel. "A lot of the triathletes use this event to gauge themselves for the larger triathlons around the state."

For some of the participants, though, the race was a way to have fun and get some great exercise.

"This is more of an endurance type of sport, and you don't

have to be good at everything. If you're good at just one event, that will make the race fun," said Capt. Kathy Novack, Marine Corps fitness and requirement standard analyst. "It was fun to motivate people as the race wore on."

Young and old alike competed against each other during the competition, and this year's event had a couple of younger people enter their first triathlon.

"I feel very tired and sore," said 11-year-old Leah Marie Schretenthaler.

Even though this was Schretenthaler's first triathlon, she managed to be one of the first 15 people to finish the 800-meter swim.

"Swimming was the easiest event for me because I'm on the swim team at the Pearl Harbor Swim Club," said Schretenthaler. "The bike race was the hardest thing for me because I have never done it before, and there was a big hill in the middle of the course that was really tough."

This year's event went exceptionally well, and the number of people who entered the race was slightly up compared to last year's event, said Krekel.

"We wanted to promote the military and it's a good way for MCB Hawaii to actually get people to see the base," said Krekel.

"This event is one of the best venues for triathletes to run," Krekel continued. "The civilian population really loves to come out and interact with the Marines who host this event."

The 1st MAW ASE Triathlon/Duathlon was also a success because of how well the event was organized, according to Novack.

"I've been in over 50 triathlons. I think this is probably the best, if not one of the best I have participated in."

## Kailua sponsors Holokiki O' Alele Windward Half Marathon

Sunday's daybreak jog unites K-Bay's military with civilian community

**KAILUA, Hawaii**—The peacefulness of an early Sunday morning in Kailua was interrupted by more than 500 distance runners testing their skills in the Windward Marathon Association's Holokiki O' Alele Half Marathon Sunday.

At 6 a.m., a gunshot sent the runners on

their way through the streets of Kailua on a winding course totaling 13 miles, testing the mettle of any who dared challenge it.

"The race was started 21 years ago to promote a sense of community between the town of Kailua and the base at Kaneohe Bay," said Carol M. Jaxon, race director. "I would like to both continue and build on that past effort," she added.

Marines of MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay have played a large role in holding and working the race on many occasions.

"For the past several years, we have enjoyed support from MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay in the way of race volunteers, course marshals, aid station staff and corpsmen," said Jaxon.

The Marines and Sailors of K-Bay were out in full force again this year, directing runner traffic, helping to alleviate pain and injuries and giving water to the runners as they made their way past.

"The Marines were great," said Jaxon. "We couldn't have done this without them."

The race was an opportunity for competitors to showcase their physical prowess and in the end, it was the fitness of Christian Friis that proved victorious.

Friis claimed the overall male championship with a final time of 1:15:22, followed in a close second by Gary Nettles, who finished at 1:15:54.

Running a slightly more distant third was Marcus Mille, who finished at 1:21:21.

For the females, Jodi Jackson, who completed the 13-mile course in 1:22:52, snatched the overall title.

Jackson was followed by Shelley Grisbrook at 1:33:59.

Rounding out the women's top three was Angie Song-Rooney at 1:34:18.

Upon completing the race, the frontrunners walked, for what may have seemed like an eternity, sweeping circles with their hands on their heads, trying desperately to regain their breath and composure after the rigors of such a demanding race.

Once all was said and done and the racers had headed for home, the town of Kailua returned to the peace and quiet for which it is famous.

## All-Marine volleyball team faced unfamiliar territory during Fort Shafter tournament

### Other teams often hit the court with five or six years of history playing together

Perhaps for a team to compete and do well in any sport, its players must be familiar with each other and have the ability to execute the game plan.

Therefore, when teammates are not accustomed to each other, it's hard for the team to compete at its peak level.

Lack of familiarity may have been a factor for the men's and women's All-Marine teams at the All-Military volleyball tournament last week at Fort Shafter.

Both teams displayed their share of inconsistent play during the tournament as neither was familiar with each other's style, nor the style of the coaches.

Since the players could not come together and gel as a team, both the men's and women's teams experienced a complete shut out. The women's team was unable to win a single game.

The talents, skills and efforts of the All-Marine teams were more than abundant, but the players hadn't spent much time

practicing and playing together.

According to both coaches, this is a problem that Marine Corps sports teams deal with every year.

"We are obviously going to need more time to practice, because there is no way we can take a group of guys who haven't played together and expect to win tournaments," said Gunnery Sgt. Jeffrey Patterson, coach of the All-Marine men's team. "You can't compete against these other teams that have been together for five or six years."

The players echoed that frustration as well.

"We had only four returnees from last year, and we just couldn't pull it together," said Staff Sgt. Charissa R. Howard, a hitter for the women's team.

"It's not just one thing, it's a combination of things," Howard added. "We would get to a certain point, and then we would hit a wall. We could not get past a certain number."

With the tough loss at the All-Military volleyball tournament, Patterson was looking at the team's potential for next year.

"A key point for next year that we need to focus on is a longer period of time for practicing instead of just three weeks before the tournament," said Patterson. "Also, in order for the team to do well, the commands are going to have to start supporting us by letting the top-quality athletes come out for the team."

Reflecting upon the difficult loss, Howard still had posi-

tive things to say about her experience here in Hawaii.

"It was fun," she said. "I just don't want anyone to be leery about coming out next year just because we didn't win. We took second last year; it's not that we can't do it. We have to come together and just be a team, and that's the bottom line."
