## Paintball facility open for all skill levels, for training, fun

Two fire teams dispersed and ran for cover behind a bunker while engaging one another in an intense firefight.

Both teams tried to advance closer toward each other, but the constant firing kept many of the team members pinned down.

One Marine headed towards a new position and, once there, noticed the crimson fluid running down his arm. He had been hit.

The player raised his hand to signal that he was hit, and, as he walked off the battlefield, attempted to wipe the paint from his arm.

This game is catching on around the world, and the paintball field at MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, has gained popularity among the island players.

Due to closure of the Bellows Paintball Facility, many military players have found their way to K-Bay, according to Robert Brumley, the paintball field manager.

“The players get a rush from playing,” said Brumley, a seven-year veteran player. “Then they just want to keep coming back.”

The experienced players look forward to beginners coming out, Brumley said, not so they can slaughter the new players, but so they can teach.

“Teaching is the philosophy here,” Brumley added. “When someone comes out for the first time, we put him under the wing of one of the more experienced players.”

Skill levels are not the only huge differences between players. People as young as 12 can play alongside the seasoned veterans.

“I saw paintball and thought it was cool,” said Josh Whann, a six-year veteran, “and I asked for a gun for Christmas. My parents got one for me.”

Josh was helping out Rich Zaleski who played his first game May 19. Zaleski, covered in sweat and paint, could not wait for the next game.

“I want to keep playing. I can’t get enough,” he said. Paintball is a team sport, and there are many different games. The paintball field at K-Bay has several different fields, and teams can play games ranging from speedball — where the teams try to completely eliminate their opponent — to capture the flag.

Unit training can also be done on the paintball field, and Brumley said the units get a more realistic training session

with paintball.

Unit training happens every Friday, and when a unit arrives, Brumley takes them through an instructional period of squad and fire team movements.

Once they’ve been schooled in tactics and suited up in all the appropriate safety gear, the units break up into teams to do one of three different missions.

The first drill is a “downed pilot” mission in which a team is assigned as a search and rescue party. Another mission is patrolling, during which each Marine must go through several checkpoints and retrieve an object at each. One of the biggest challenges of the patrolling mission are the ambushes set up to distract the team from their mission. The final mission is attack and defend, where one squad must attempt to overrun the other’s stronghold.

Whether it is for recreational play on the weekend or training on Friday, Brumley said paintball is fun for everyone.

The field is open from 12:30 p.m. to 4 p.m. Fridays for units only; 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturdays, and 12:30 p.m. to 4 p.m. Sundays, for the public.

## K-Bay Dragons burn AMR, 37-19, closing a perfect season

The Kaneohe Bay Dragons completed a perfect season Saturday by scorching the AMR Dragons, 37 to 19 in coach pitch division action at K-Bay.

"The goal was to improve the kids' skills, and if we win that's just extra," said Dragon Coach Mike Johnson.

The K-Bay team, comprised of 7- to 9-year-olds, had a lot of "extra" this season.

Traveling to Wheeler Army Air Field, Scho-field Barracks and Alimanu Military Reservation in addition to their home games at Kaneohe, the Dragons demonstrated a tough defense that had opponents fighting an uphill battle all year.

This gritty defense combined with

an explosive offense proved too much for the opposition as the Dragons finished with 8 wins against 0 losses.

The K-Bay team used this formula Saturday against the Dragons from AMR. Defensive gems were turned in by several of the Dragons during the first inning, as first baseman Mike Johnson doubled up the other team when he caught a high pop fly then tagged the runner up at first.

Pitcher Clifton Hughes proved tough on the mound as he threw several would-be base runners out at first, and Anthony Cardon turned in several key infield plays.

The Dragons potent offense caught fire in the second inning as Hutch Vivian and Colin McDougall led the hitting parade.

Desiree Flores and Shane Haley al-

so contributed to the onslaught which didn't end until the inning's final hitter, Victor Chatman launched a triple, clearing the bases.

Marine Corps Community Services Sports Specialist, Clark Abbey said that about 130 kids participated in baseball this year from K-Bay.

"This year's season was successful. The players have all really improved, the parents were great and the coaches demonstrated great sportsmanship," said Abbey.

"The kids have all had fun," he added.

As the K-Bay kids participated in one last "Dragon stomp," and got their final post game snacks of this year, Dragon Matthew Dolan said that he liked playing baseball with all of his friends best of all.
