## When the lights go out, K-Bay Lanes takes bowling to the extreme

Take the current music played in clubs with black lights and light patterns flashing all around and put it all into a 25-lane bowling center and K-Bay residents can experience the thrills of Semper Xtreme Bowling.

K-Bay Lanes, aboard MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, offers a change to the typical well lit, quiet bowling area many people are use to four days a week.

Colonel Michael Olson, deputy commander of MCB Hawaii, rolled the first ball to officially open Semper Xtreme Bowling to K-Bay, nearly two years ago.

Now, due to the popularity of the event, bowlers have to sign up ahead of time to bowl during the time of extreme bowling.

There are many reasons why someone might decide to go bowling instead of clubbing on a weekend. A change of pace or simply a place to take kids are just some of the reasons to go extreme bowling.

Travis Osurman, 13, Trenton Oshiro, 12, Sean Osurman, 10, and Bronson Tani-Higa, 10, all came to experience Semper Xtreme Bowling while celebrating Travis' birthday.

"I haven't been here (K-Bay Lanes) in a long time," said Oshiro. "The last time

I was here was for a 6th grade field trip."

All the boys, wearing average day board shorts and T-shirts, noticed a change as they came through the doors.

The flower patterns on the board shorts suddenly magnified as the power of the black lights made white on clothing turn to a glow.

Everyone that comes to the lanes with white or light colored clothing can notice the change to the color of their outfits.


There are bowling balls designed for extreme bowling. Under regular fluorescent lights, they appear to be green, red, orange or purple, however, when a bowler brings a ball under the black lights, it takes on a different glow.

If the glowing clothes and bowling balls aren't enough, a light projector illuminates different patterns and colors, making the lights dance around the alley.

Visit K-Bay Lanes on Wednesday from 6-11:30 p.m., Friday from 11 p.m. to 3 a.m., Saturday from 2:30-5:30 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. to 3 a.m., Sunday from 6-11 p.m. and on holidays from 2:30-11 p.m., to experience a black light night bowling.

The price for Semper Xtreme Bowling is close to a dollar more a game than regular bowling, at \$2.25. Shoe rentals are \$1.25.



## Website offers MCCS news at your fingertips

In order for Marines and Sailors to be able to complete their missions successfully they must remain informed of what's going on in their community, whether that community is in garrison or in the field.

The Marine Corps Community Services' marketing department, seeing the need to be able to preset their information, has created a new website for base personnel to use to stay abreast of the situation.

While conventional methods of getting information - newspaper, television, posters, etc. - are still available, the marketing department has made the leap into the 21st cen-

tury with the MCCS website, www.mccshawaii.com.

The website, launched Oct. 2, has all MCCS activities, events and services available to the Internet consumer with just a mouse click.

One of the main goals of the website is for it to be attractive to the eye, easy to navigate and constantly changing, marketing director Jim Bocci said.

"The website is very organic; it's not designed to be static," Bocci said. "We feel like we have one of the best sites of its kind."

The principal architect of the website is Marcia Kolton, who said she essentially self-taught herself the skills she needed to make the website come alive.

"It was a wonderful learning process, and there's much more to learn how to do. We're going to keep improving the site to give the customer the best we can," Kolton said.

By implementing the MCB Hawaii MCCS information onto the Web, it not only gives base personnel easy access to MCCS, but it also gives personnel en route to MCB Hawaii a valuable tool in helping them with the move.

"It's definitely a useful tool when a Marine or Sailor is completing permanent change of station orders. It's a great improvement over the old site," Bocci said.

The website has a listing of all MCCS activities, from the Personal

Services branch to the Semper Fit Center. It is presented in an attractive arrangement that makes it easy for even novice web surfers to find what they need.

Each month, due to the creative efforts of Kolton and Debbie Aisoff, MCCS marketing public affairs specialist, access to upcoming events is available through a topical link. An example of this was apparent in December, when a blinking red light on Rudolph the Reindeer's nose led the way to the web link, because "the nose knows."

Now MCB Hawaii personnel, and anyone from outside the base, have complete coverage of the activities that MCCS offers its Marine, Sailor and civilian customers.

## K-Bay waters give island emergency workers a break

Oahu's rescue workers have seen the effects that the wild surf can have on many an occasion, and often-times those effects result in a matter of life or death.

So it was a welcome change of pace for the lifeguards, police officers, fire fighters and paramedics of the island to be able to get out and actually enjoy the waves.

Emergency workers congregated at MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay's Pyramid Rock Beach Jan. 12 to relax, commiserate and, of course, hang ten. The emergency workers across the island try to get together periodically to socialize, said Jeff S. Barbieto, a MCB Hawaii lifeguard and organizer of the surf event.

"The surf meet here is about building camaraderie and friendly competition," Barbieto said. "We're in Hawaii and everybody loves to surf so it's a great way to get everybody together."

The benefit of the social event wasn't just to grab a burger and soda after catching a swell. The familiarity that the rescue workers gain during these get-togethers helps out in times of need, too, said Reid Shimabuka, a fire fighter with the Federal Fire Department station at Wheeler Army Air Base.

"The camaraderie between emergency agencies

helps when an emergency arises, because we all are familiar with each other and that helps with teamwork in a tough situation," said Shimabuka, who also served as a judge for the rescuers' surfing competition.

"The trust is there because when the organizations get together it brings us close. The job is based on teamwork, so this really helps," said Joey Sonognini, a fire fighter with the Federal Fire Department aboard MCB Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay.

Sonognini was one of the participants in the surfing competition, taking his longboard out amidst the rough and choppy two-foot waves at Pyramid Rock Beach Friday. Though the conditions were perhaps less than desirable, the wave riders appeared to enjoy the surfing, just the same.

"There's not too many competitions where the conditions are perfect. I've definitely surfed in worse," Sonognini said after battling the waves.

Barbieto enlisted the support of a variety of local surf companies, such as RNR Surf and Ski, Local Motion and Gordon Hansen Shapes, to provide prizes for the winners of the surf events.

The day of fun in the surf and sun was a boost to everyone involved; the rescue workers were able to relax and build upon their professional friendships, and the people who count on them to be at top form in an emergency can rest assured that the rescuers will be ready to perform as a team in a crunch.
